

Going to the Grand Canyon is the highlight of this rally, especially when you do it on the Grand Canyon Railroad which is included in the rally fees. This is a full day event which allows you to take some guided tours or visit the grand Canyon village or both.

We will also be touring Bearizona which is both a natural wildlife park showing many of the North American animals in their wild habitat as well as a walking tour to see the animals up close

Lowell Observatory is next on our schedule. We will tour their facilities and see the giant telescope that found Pluto. We are also checking into the possibility for Lowell Observatory to bring a telescope to our RV park so we can view the planets live.

Coos Bay Rally Recap Thoughts by Rob and Gerri Brown

First and probably most important was our chance to really get to know our Rally masters Ron and Sharon Brandt. It is a real plus to have an experienced rally master live in the area you are planning to visit. Ron and Sharon came to stay with us in Nampa Idaho for 3 days and work on the rally schedule and event timings. We had 22 coaches signed up and we were the first rally ever held in this brand new park which turned out to be head and shoulders above all the others in the area. The challenge was if the Event Center was going to be finished in time. The spaces were all large, designed for 45 foot rigs with toads. We had the entire loop except for one space on the end that was rented monthly.

We stayed with Ron and Sharon at their lovely home about 2 miles from the RV Park. We arrived in 60 degree temps with rain threating and lots of wind. Oregon in June can be nasty. Part of the plan for our early time was to go fishing to provide fish for the first night's Fish Fry and Pot Luck. The wind was so bad that we were unable to get out of the harbor due to small craft warnings along the coast. Fortunately, Ron had been able to go out one day in the previous 10 and thought we had enough fillets. Turned out to be just enough! We both moved over to the Park on Sunday to join some of the early birds that were arriving. The weather was improving and we saw the sun again for a bit. Still the wind was significant so we decided to hold off on setting up the pop-up until the night of the Fish Fry. Wednesday afternoon was really nice so we set up the canopy and organized for the Fish Fry. Two of our travelers with sick motorhomes came for dinner. One rented a park owned Airstream trailer and was able to attend the entire rally. The other drove over from Eugene, Oregon just so they could at least meet the group. They were new members and this was to be their first rally. We really liked them and appreciated the 150 mile round trip just to have dinner with the club. Out came the propane burners and the margarita machine and "Relax by the Bay" had a great first dinner with Ron's local fish fillets cooked to perfection by Mark and Jim while Daren kept the ice flowing in the margarita machine. All was going great, the weather was co-operating, people were renewing old friendships and suddenly, one of our master fish chefs disappeared. He had just had the coach washed and the cleaners had shut off the water to use the external water faucet. Since our fish needed cooking, he was not there when the cleaners finished up and turned the water back on. Unfortunately, one of the interior faucets had been left on and, of course, his tank valves were shut.

So, guess what happens when the gray water holding tank over flows. It comes out your shower drain. The good news was that the washer company also was a carpet care company. They brought out dryers and dehumidifiers so restoration began immediately.

Thursday breakfast was a catered breakfast burrito, with coffee, tea and juice. We took over the brand new Event Center with beautiful view of the bay which was only feet away. Sharon passed out maps for the day's trip to The Animal Safari in Bandon to which we carpooled with Ron in the lead. Everyone seemed to enjoy the trip and interacting with the animals with lots of photos being taken. Then we returned with stops at Misty Meadows, a gift shop featuring jams and other goodies made from local produce. Then on to Face Rock Creamery for cheese tasting, lunch and ice cream. Dinner that evening, after a social hour, was a Catered Lasagna Dinner. After dinner, the group was given a sheet of foolscap and crayons and was asked to draw something they encountered that day that was inspiring.

Friday breakfast was a casserole of eggs, sausage, potatoes and cheese. Fresh fruit, coffee, tea and juice completed the menu. This was a free morning. Early in the afternoon we carpooled to downtown Coos Bay to participate in a wine walk sponsored by the local Rotary club. We walked to a several local businesses for a a taste of wine in our new RMCC logo wine glass. The Chamber of Commerce welcome sign flashed greetings to the Rocky Mountain Country Coaches. That evening we walked (some stumbled) into The Blue Heron restaurant where we had a great "German" dinner.





Saturday breakfast was again catered, but this time biscuit, egg, ham or sausage sandwiches were available along with fresh fruit coffee, tea and juice. Sharon explained the day's events and passed out maps to Shore Acres, a historical site and gardens right on the cliffs overlooking the Oregon coast. Afterwards many of us stopped for lunch at a restaurant right on the bay before going to the Marine Museum. Dinner was back in our Private meeting room with the incredible view and this time it was Prime Rib, again catered, an expertly carved by Master meat cutter Ron Brandt. 7 winners of the previous Art contest were announced. Their masterpieces were displayed and prizes awarded.
